

We have performed a physical inspection of those facilities and areas covered by the "Intermunicipal Cooperation Agreement for Operation, Management and Improvement of City of Buffalo Parklands" dated July 1, 2004 for the period August 10 through August 18th, 2005.

Our examination was made in accordance with standards established by the Institute of Internal Auditors, The American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the United States Government Accounting Office and, accordingly, included such procedures as we considered necessary under the circumstances.

In our opinion, the accompanying schedules and related comments present fairly the operations for the period then ended in conformity with generally accepted municipal accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding period.

Background and History

Parks and parks maintenance is a “basic City service.” As such it requires a municipal agreement to have another government entity perform the maintenance function. That is what took place between the owner, the City of Buffalo, and the County of Erie. The agreement is dated July 1, 2004 and is titled, “Intermunicipal Cooperation Agreement for Operation, Management and Improvement of City of Buffalo Parklands.”

GMU - General Municipal

Article 5-G - MUNICIPAL COOPERATION

§ 119-o. Performance of municipal cooperative activities; alternative powers; alternative assignment of responsibilities.

1. In addition to any other general or special powers vested in municipal corporations and districts for the performance of their respective functions, powers or duties on an individual, cooperative, joint or contract basis, municipal corporations and districts shall have power to enter into, amend, cancel and terminate agreements for the performance among themselves or one for the other of their respective functions, powers and duties on a cooperative or contract basis or for the provision of a joint service or a joint water, sewage or drainage project. Notwithstanding the foregoing grant of authority, the temporary investment of moneys by more than one municipal corporation or district pursuant to a municipal cooperation agreement which meets the definition of "cooperative investment agreement" as set forth in article three-A of this chapter shall be in compliance with all of the requirements of that article. Any agreement entered into hereunder shall be approved by each participating municipal corporation or district by a majority vote of the voting strength of its governing body. Where the authority of any municipal corporation or district to perform by itself any function, power and duty or to provide by itself any facility, service, activity, project or undertaking or the financing thereof is, by any other general or special law, subject to a public hearing, a mandatory or permissive referendum, consents of governmental agencies, or other requirements applicable to the making of contracts, then its right to participate in an agreement hereunder shall be similarly conditioned.

The Agreement reads:

“The agreement shall be (15) years commencing July 1, 2004 and expiring June 30, 2019, unless this Agreement shall be terminated prior thereto pursuant to the termination provisions set forth herein.”

Under Article IX – Audit reads:

“The County, upon reasonable notice from the City, shall make available to the City such books, papers and other items which evidence the County’s revenues and expenses relating to providing operation, management and improvement to the City for its Parklands.”

Audit Objectives:

To review the condition of various City of Buffalo parks now maintained by the County of Erie as per the “Intermunicipal Cooperation Agreement for Operation, Management and Improvement of City of Buffalo Parklands” in order to determine their level of maintenance, in accordance with this agreement.

Audit Program:

In order to determine the condition of each park reviewed, the following items were observed. Each item was given a number from one to five, **five being the worst rating**. All categories were reviewed at each location visited and pictures were taken. Not every location had the equipment or facilities we sought to review. The inspection took place over five days and results of the rating were reviewed by the team for a second time after completing the walking tour. The categories chosen do not require an expertise

in forestry or engineering but to provide a citizen with a common sense appraisal of the condition.

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The condition of all the parks reviewed here can and do change based on occupancy level. Workers do clean and replace broken items on a regular basis, as funds permit. This review can only comment on what was seen at the time of our investigation. A point remains that this investigation took place during business hours on weekdays.

Discussions with Parks employees and park users confirm that parks usage, condition, and the type of individual using the park, can and often do change during the evening and over the weekend.

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It was something of a surprise to compare the Olmsted parks to the other City parks, and to compare the baseline facilities to City parks as well. In each Olmsted park the team visited, we observed routine maintenance being performed: litter was being picked up, playground equipment was being maintained and grass was being mowed and watered. Our other baseline facilities demonstrated a similar level of care: two (Buffalo Naval and Serviceman’s Park and the Botanical Gardens) are undergoing major capital improvements and one (All High Stadium) is scheduled for a major capital improvement. All the other City owned County maintained parks we visited (24) had only three maintenance crews during our audit.

Discussions with City staff reveal that capital improvements are scheduled for City parks, albeit the money set aside for such improvements has dropped dramatically in the past two years. Budgeted amounts for Parks related capital projects have fallen more than 50% since the 2001-02 fiscal year. Under the agreement with the County, the City must pay for all capital improvements to the Parks covered in the agreement.

Also under the agreement between the County and the City, the City must make quarterly payments to the County for parks “operations and management services.” Four payments are due to the County each year, on July 1, October 1, January 1 and April 1, each payment being \$450,000. As of the close of our fieldwork, August 18th, 2005, all payments due to the County by the City have been made as per the agreement.

The audit team focused on observing several parks a day during the audit period. Additionally, the team made a concerted effort to examine parks in each council district, and parks of all types, in order to confirm that all parks are cared for equally. Highlights of our results appear below. The entire list of parks we reviewed, and the rankings for each category are located in Appendix One. To determine the location of each park within the City, a council district map has been provided in Appendix Two. Due to the

number of parks reviewed, and the size of the map, we did not plot out the individual parks reviewed on the map in Appendix Two.

The Council District with the most rankings indicative of poor condition was the Fillmore District. That ranking was influenced heavily by Father Conway Park, a park in need of major work. The Council District with the best overall ranking was the North District. The North District's rating was strongly influenced by the positive numbers generated by Riverside Park, an Olmsted Park.

The category group with the best average ranking was Trees and Shrubs. This is not a surprise considering a record-breaking summer of sunshine. The category group with the poorest rankings overall was Restrooms. Most of the public restrooms reviewed require fixture repair or replacement, painting, and a thorough cleaning.

The individual category that received a consistently poor ranking, was the category of Bathroom Odor. The very warm summer, low maintenance on some facilities, and some vandalism combined to rank the City's public bathrooms as – well – rank. The best performing category citywide was that of park signs. Most park signs are in great condition, are easy to read, and pleasing to the eye.

Comments on Individual Parks

Delaware Park – The Park was beautiful when we visited, except for the brown grass. Rain has since cleared up that problem. Some bathrooms were closed, notably near the 198 expressway, and a few paths need work. Overall, this is a great park to visit. As with every Olmsted Park we visited, we spotted employees working on various tasks as we made our review.

Gates Circle – Although not strictly a park, it is a valuable respite from the city's concrete. Good benches and grass provide a great place to take a break if you work at the hospital. The fountain's use as a pool has been curbed by signage and opening of other pools in other parks.

Amherst/Middlesex – Green space for the neighborhood. Nothing here but trees and grass.

Masten Park – Of all the parks visited, this is one of the two worst. It needs major repairs to the recreation building, due to many incidents of vandalism. A chain link fence was stolen two days before our inspection. Neither of the two pools was operational. New playground fixtures were being installed during our visit. A night watchman or increased Police patrols need to be implemented. Hopefully, this would stop the actions of the few individuals bent on destroying equipment, damaging the recreation building and stealing its equipment.

Sperry Park - A small area but very clean and well kept.

John F Kennedy Park – A larger park, with playgrounds and a ball diamond. Graffiti and petty vandalism keeps this from being a fabulous family park.

LaSalle Park – A beautiful playground with a nearby pavilion. A great place for kids.

Fronczak Park – This area is in good shape but playground equipment needs some minor repairs and ball fields need the same.

Father Conway Park – Along with Masten, this is the other park that needs major attention. Litter was everywhere, and graffiti was everywhere on the playground equipment. The basketball and tennis courts are weed infested and overgrown; a real eyesore. It is our understanding that these courts will be broken up and removed and the area regraded. (NOTE – this did occur upon conclusion of our fieldwork)

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Hennapin Park – A generally clean park, with the only problem being weeds and overgrowth evident on the cement steps and between play areas/playground equipment. A crew was placing and grading wood chips into the playground area during our inspection.

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Broderick Park – A fisherman's delight, however, the park has problems with litter. The refreshment stand was locked solidly, as were the restroom facilities. The breakwater is a VERY long walk and has some minor graffiti.

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George Washington Park – Green space that overlooks the river. It is in good condition.

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

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

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
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



Olmstead v All Others



The above graph lists out the parks reviewed, broken out into to categories – Olmsted Parks and All Others. Reminding the reader that a lower number is a better rating, the Olmsted parks consistently outperform all the other parks, with one notable exception. The Olmsted Parks lost the areas of Public Bathrooms. The audit team’s explanation for this statistical twist is located in the number of City parks that have public bathrooms that are NOT open. Four City locations had public facilities that were locked. Had these facilities been open for the use of the public, perhaps the City ratings would have been much different.


Parks by District Summary




The above graph is of average rankings of the parks reviewed by Council district. This chart includes all facilities reviewed by the audit team, without regard to maintenance responsibility.

Each Council District has been graphed out in the next pages. A reminder to the reader: lower numbers are better rankings. A one is excellent, and five is the worst grade that can be handed out. Items that cannot be evaluated were graded as a zero.


Delaware District Parks




Ellicott District Parks




Fillmore District



Lovejoy District




Masten District



Areas Reviewed




Niagara District Parks




Areas Reviewed





The following photos highlight certain areas and elements in our assessment of the condition of the Parks. Note please the audit team took over forty photos, space and technical limitations limit the presentation to but a few.



Repairs made to the Masten Park Community Center, located in the Ellicott District. This is the point at which thieves entered the structure. The thieves ransacked the food pantry, ruined pool machinery and stole fencing from the property.

Masten Park pool, unused, unfilled and not likely to be repaired.

This is Martin Luther King Park in the Masten District. The wading pool was operational when we visited; the lack of swimmers is a result of the time the audit team arrived. The pool was not open to the public when this photo was taken.



The below photo is from McCarthy Park in the University district. The condition of this play area is excellent.



This is a view of Walden Park in the Lovejoy Council District. The fencing and bleachers need maintenance.



This photo was taken at Walden Park in the Lovejoy District and is of the play area. The slide and other portions of the structure are in good condition, however, the graffiti is deplorable. Please do note the wood chips beneath the play area, this is exactly how such an area should look according to the manufacturer's guidelines.

A play area at Cazenovia Park in Buffalo's South Council District. This playground is in excellent condition with the exception of the absence of chips or sand covering the base of the play area.





A small portion of the Erie County Botanical Gardens in Buffalo's South Council District. The facility is in excellent condition and was under renovation during our inspection. With respect to the field auditor in the photograph, please note the anomaly – a field auditor sitting down.

This is the fountain and wading pool in Trinidad Park in the Masten District. It is not operational.





This is another view of Trinidad Park. The bleachers, fencing and grounds all need attention.

This is a view of Gates Circle in the Delaware District. This fountain is maintained by the Olmsted Parks Conservatory. The care taken of this location is evident.





The above photo is from Father Conway Park, in the Fillmore District. This swing set clearly needs maintenance.

Once again, Father Conway Park in the Fillmore District. This photo of the tennis courts and fencing shows why this park was the lowest rated park in the audit. Since the visit of the audit team, this court was dug up and removed from the park.





A view along a path along the Valley Nature Trail, located in the Fillmore District. This really is one of Buffalo's hidden treasures. A note to those who would walk these paths; they are longer than you would expect.

The play area at Stachowski-Houghton Park in the South District. A very clean and well-maintained play area, lacking only sand or wood chips for the base. This is one notch away from flawless. Please also note the operational pool in the background.





Another view of Stachowski-Houghton Park in the South District, showing the splash pool. Although an underground pipe was leaking at the time of our visit, the splash pool is still operational and in use. The puddle in the foreground is a result of the broken pipe. The basketball courts in the background are in excellent condition.

Below is a view from the Squaw Island Park bike path in the Niagara District. The view is looking west toward the Peace Bridge. This path is well used by bikers, runners and the US Border Patrol. (The trees in the right background are in Canada.) Other than some graffiti, this is a beautiful path to exercise on and very popular with the local fishermen. The path from this point to the end of the breakwater is about two and one-half miles.





One of the outdoor grills at Broderick Park, in the Niagara District. It is badly in need of replacement.

This is another view of Broderick Park in the Niagara District. This is a lovely park marred only by the graffiti and litter.





A view most people seldom see – the very end of the breakwater leading from Broderick Park. Please compare this view to that photo taken from Squaw Island Park. A walk not for the faint of heart, the view is excellent. There is some graffiti and some litter.

Can you tell that this playground is located in an Olmsted Park? This area is in Front Park, in the Niagara District. Flawless.





LaSalle Park, in the Ellicott District. This area was in very good condition. Some graffiti was evident, but the area has been well maintained.

Below is an example of the signage the City uses to identify its parks. The signs were well-placed and in excellent condition throughout our audit. This location is Towpath Park in the North District.
